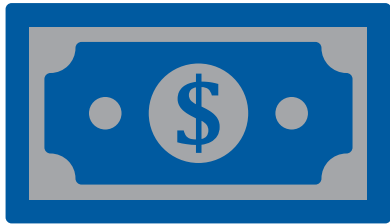
Inside *the Numbers*

Scholarship allocations have increased steadily in the last decade, topping \$1 million for the first time during fiscal year 2017 and \$2 million in fiscal year 2023. The fiscal year 2023 allotment represents a record amount of support and a more than 300% increase in support when compared to fiscal year 2013.



Scholarship Impact

Through the DMACC Foundation, students from nearly 100 academic and technical programs receive scholarship support. Numbers below are from fiscal year 2023.

Growth of Foundation has contributed to success across DMACC's campuses.

With the establishment of the DMACC Foundation 50 years ago, the concept of service was at its core. With a focused and engaged Board, remarkable things have happened during the last five decades.

From dozens of capital improvement projects to millions of dollars of support for student scholarships, the DMACC Foundation—and the thousands of private donors who have made gifts—has been a critical contributor to the College's growth and success in the past five decades.

In the Beginning

With humble roots and under the direction of its first Executive Director Richard Byerly, the initial aim of the DMACC Foundation was to establish a structure for accepting donations—to include a payroll deduction system for staff donations—and to create a scholarship fund. From Day 1, the Foundation was focused on building relationships with leaders in the community.

“The DMACC Foundation Board had a really strong and extensive network throughout the metropolitan business community that extended all the way up to Ames and back down to Des Moines,” says Jeff Segin, who was among the earliest members of the Foundation Board. “I was interested in having an opportunity to serve with them.”

The Foundation started with a total budget of \$43,000 for scholarships and grew at a steady pace. By leveraging the connections Segin speaks of, in 1978, 141 scholarships totaling \$130,120 were delivered to students at the DMACC Ankeny, Urban and Boone Campuses—the three campuses that existed at the time.

An Expanding Reach

That spirit of service in the early years led to the Foundation's support of projects that saw DMACC's reach expand through the 1980s and 90s with the additions of the DMACC Carroll Campus, DMACC Newton Campus and DMACC West Campus. Tom Friedman began his Foundation Board service in the midst of this rapid growth. He says that while bricks and mortar were important, the mission of the Foundation remained focused on serving students.

“The foundation wasn't nearly as large then as it is now,” Friedman says. “Our primary goal was to raise money specifically for scholarships for people who wanted to go to school but might not be able to afford it. We wanted to help them further their education so that they could go into the world and make Iowa a better place to work and live.”

Setting the Stage for Continued Growth

Into the 2000s, the Board's scope expanded to assisting with a series of high-profile capital projects that included notable

expansions on nearly every campus including Southridge Center, Perry VanKirk Center, Ames Hunziker Center, Iowa Culinary Institute, the Karl Chevrolet Automotive Training Center, Boone Student Activity Center, Criminal Justice Training Center, the Carroll Campus expansion and more.

The growth in support for facilities didn't diminish from the Foundation's initial emphasis of supporting students. During the last decade alone, scholarship allotments have increased by more than 300%, including a record \$2 million this year. For those who served in the early years, the impressive growth of the Foundation comes as no surprise.

“The whole time I was on the board, you could see we were making a difference with the scholarship program and with a number of special projects,” Segin says. “You could see how the leadership of the Foundation Board working closely with the leadership of DMACC was able to bring forth a lot of great opportunities throughout the entire DMACC region.”

Today & the Future of the DMACC Foundation

The first Director of the DMACC Foundation was tasked with developing a mechanism in which donors could provide private gifts in support of student scholarships. From its founding under Richard Byerly through today's leadership of Tara Connolly, the Foundations Executive Directors have played a critical role in advancing support for the College.

In its 50 years, the Foundation has allocated more than \$19,470,892 in student scholarships, 73% of which has been distributed in the last 11 years.

This year's celebration of our 50th anniversary has provided an opportunity to look back on our journey,” Connolly says. “I feel fortunate to serve in a role that has been filled by some remarkable individuals during the last five decades. They laid the groundwork for the incredible things we are doing today. That service-first philosophy has sustained us for 50 years and I am confident it is what will guide the Foundation in the next 50 years.

Today the DMACC Foundation has assets of \$21 million and allocates \$2 million in scholarship support. Recently completed strategic planning will facilitate growth in the Foundations footprint and help us to better serve students.

Decades of Excellence

For five decades, the DMACC Foundation has provided critical financial support to ensure students can pursue their dream.

Throughout 2022, we have reflected on the DMACC Foundation's 50 years of service to students, faculty, staff and the community. We have had the opportunity to visit with current and former scholarship winners, donors, faculty and staff, board members and those throughout our communities. Engaging with those we have served—and those who have served the Foundation—helped us gain deeper insight and appreciation for the impact the Foundation has had in its five decades of existence.

Notably, the conversations we've had for this issue of *DMACC Magazine* have been humbling. We are proud to share the stories of this handful of our alumni, knowing our donors played an instrumental role in giving so many remarkable students their start.

'70s

Tamara & Marty Kenworthy

While Tamara and Marty Kenworthy had different reasons for choosing DMACC's Boone Campus, their experience there leaves them with warm memories. The couple met there in the late 1970s.

Marty chose DMACC primarily to play baseball while he took a pre-engineering class load. Tamara, a native of Boone, was looking for a college option that would allow her to identify a potential career path. The college proved a perfect fit for them both.

"The first thing DMACC gave us is that it is where we met and dated," says Marty, who practices business, commercial real estate and construction law. The couple pursued different colleges after DMACC and then rekindled their romance at a friend's wedding and have been married for 38 years. "In addition to that, the curriculum was robust and prepared me for my studies at Bradley."

"For me, I had the opportunity to participate in groups like FBLA-PBL," Tamara says of the oldest and largest student business organization in the country, which still has a chapter on the Boone Campus. "That experience gave me tremendous speaking, leadership and business opportunities that I continue to credit today."

Tamara, while completing her education at UNI and the University of Cincinnati with an MBA, owns a planning, research and marketing firm called On Point Strategies, and continues to give back to DMACC as Secretary of the Foundation Board. Marty has served as an adjunct professor in the past. In addition, the couple gives generously in support of students.

"We believe in DMACC," Tamara says. "It offers education for a variety of career paths and a better life for a lot of students."





Rick Hermann

The college journey was anything but a straight line for Rick Hermann. He started his studies at Iowa State University in the late 1970s, but soon realized it wasn't a good fit. It was his sister who finally encouraged him to give DMACC a try.

"I transitioned to DMACC and it was like an oasis," says Rick, who studied Business Administration on the Ankeny Campus. "It honestly prepared me to transition to an even more advanced level of education, in a manner that required I take it seriously."

Rick used the foundation of his DMACC education, which was supported in part by scholarships from the DMACC Foundation, to get into sales. Today, he is the National Outside Sales Director for Weathertech Automotive. While his studies have proved instrumental in his career, he says his fondness for DMACC is about more than what he learned.

"DMACC is where I met my wife, Mary," Rick says. "That is the best thing I took out of my time there."

'80s

Darren Herrold

Certain he wanted to be a teacher, Darren Herrold threw himself into his Liberal Arts studies on DMACC's Ankeny Campus in the early 1990s. He eventually landed on a specialty in history.

"The history professors I had were just awesome," Darren says. "They made everything relevant and it was so enjoyable. They prepared me to focus on my learning and my education moving forward. The DMACC experience set the foundation for me to be a successful student."

In addition to his studies, Darren spent two years in student government at DMACC. Today he is a history teacher and a member of the DMACC Alumni Association Committee. He says giving back to DMACC ensures that today's students have access to the same opportunities that proved so valuable for him.

"It is a good feeling to know we're raising money to fund scholarships," says Darren, who benefited from Foundation scholarships while he was at DMACC. "Giving back is a great way for alumni to have a voice on DMACC's campuses."



'90s

Christina Moffatt

In her studies and in her work, Christina Moffatt has learned that bigger isn't always better. It was the small class sizes and more hands-on approach that impressed her about DMACC in the late 1990s and early 2000s. She now helps small businesses make a big splash as a Business Development Officer at PurposeBank, a division of VisionBank.

She says the individualized education she received at DMACC inspired her to help aspiring business owners in a variety of stops during her career.

"For me it was just such a pivotal time," Christina says. "DMACC allowed me to grow without having a definitive answer of what I was going to be for the rest of my life."

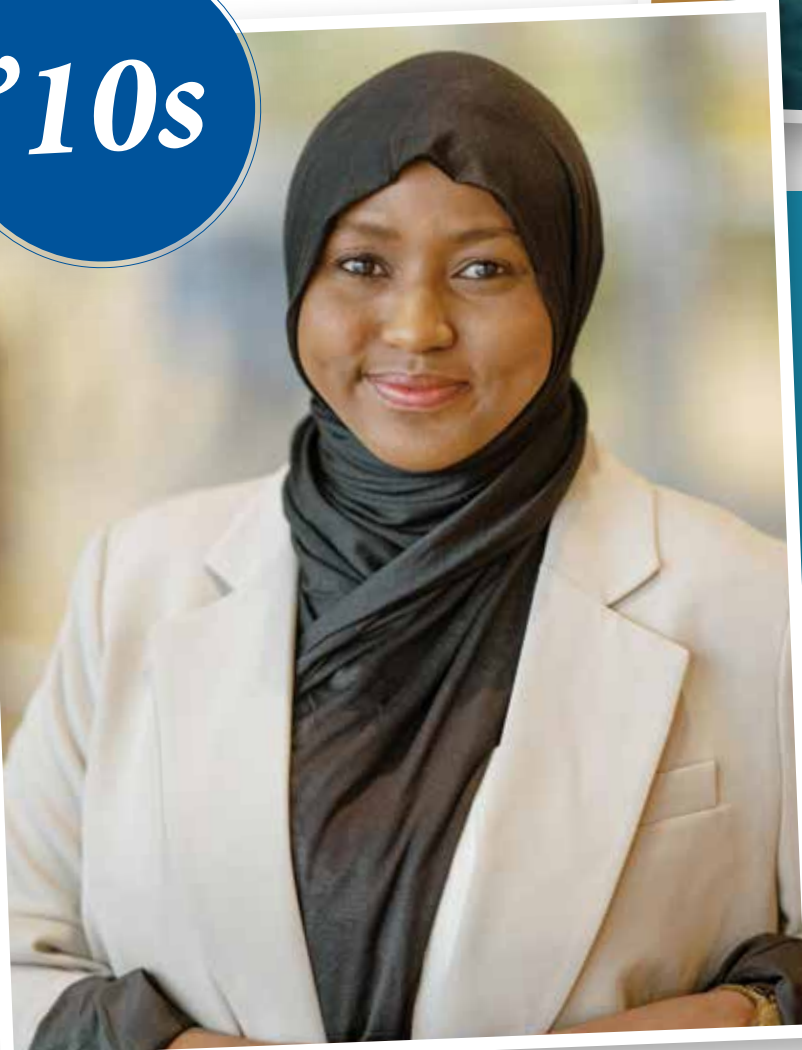
She remains involved with DMACC in a number of ways today and says the school continues to impress.

New Facility Opens on Ankeny Campus

We hosted an Open House and Ribbon Cutting on Friday, Sept. 9, to celebrate the new DMACC Criminal Justice Training Center on the Ankeny Campus.

The 1,500-square-foot training center provides a realistic setting, complete with traditional home furnishings and top-notch equipment, that allows for enhanced learning and training opportunities for our Criminal Justice students, as well as criminal justice professionals from throughout Iowa and beyond. A total of 82 donors contributed more than \$300,000 to help fund construction of the new Center.

DMACC President Rob Denson says the new Criminal Justice Training Center “is truly a DMACC facility.” It was designed by the DMACC Architectural Technologies Program with the assistance of Program Chair and Professor Mike Gatzke, and constructed by students in the DMACC Building Trades Program under the direction of Program Chair and Professor Ned Rasmussen. Students in the DMACC Horticulture program also helped landscape the exterior.

The Center has already seen significant use by students and criminal justice agencies for training purposes. There is no other facility like it in Central Iowa, and very few comparable facilities exist on college campuses across the nation.
